DUTCH-ENGLISH BARN

Clifford Reed and his committee (Jim Souders, Jim Britton, Trevor LePrevost, Victor Mount, Donald Schenck) have done a wonderful job in arranging and identifying the many tools, farm equipment and some household items that would have been used by farmers in earlier years. It has taken a lot of effort to identify some of the items, their use, approximate year and even original cost.

Visiting the barn will give visitors a good education in how a farmer's life was spent in the days before electric power was available.

ONE ROOM SCHOOLHOUSE



Dutch Neck one-room schoolhouse, Village Rd. West.

The photo above shows the Dutch Neck one room schoolhouse on Village Rd. West, now a private home. It is similar to the schoolhouse on the Schenck Farmstead that was moved from next to the Maurice Hawk School and known as the Parsonage School.

Our schoolhouse will have a "stoop," which means a small roof over the door, as well as the step in front of the entrance doorway. It will also have a cupola.

The many school desks that have been collected and donated have now been cleaned and arranged inside the schoolhouse. A cabinet of school books will be on view, as well as many photographs of West Windsor school classes going back to the 19th century.

Our aim is to give visitors an idea of what school would have been like before the Dutch Neck and Penns Neck 4-room schools were built in 1917.

We hope that school class tours will soon begin to visit the Farmstead, in particular the one-room schoolhouse.

OUT BUILDINGS:

COACH HOUSE – The building has been redone and holds sleighs and wagons, as well as equipment for the horses that pulled them.

LAVATORIES – The Council has begun building a public lavatory at the end of the garage for use when events are held in the barn.
